A Message from the Director

Dear IAA Community,

Welcome to the second week of Term 2! We have two more weeks to go until the February break.

You must have all read and heard about the road safety awareness at IAA last week. We hosted the EU Commissioner for Transport Violetta Bulc and UN Secretary General's Special Envoy for Road Safety Jean Todt who shared with IAA students ways to contribute to safer roads and save lives. I was shocked to hear that the World Health Organisation estimates that 2,306 people died on Jordan's roads in 2016; meaning 2,306 lives wasted, lives of mothers, fathers, brothers, sisters, husbands, wives and children! The visitors were on a tour spreading awareness on the UN initiative designated to road traffic safety that aims to cut the number of deaths from traffic accidents, which exceed one million fatalities per year, globally, and cost more than \$500 billion, according to World Health Organisation data.

Speaking of loss, I was saddened to hear of the passing of Dr James Patrick Craig last week. James was the founder of our libraries and worked at IAA for over two years back in 2010. He also chaired the CIS accreditation committee. I recall his guffaws that filled our corridors and his love for Turkish coffee. Those who knew him surely miss him. Our thoughts and prayers are with his family at this difficult time and may he rest in peace.

I am proud of our Grade 9 students who travelled to Japan yesterday to take part in the Rits Global Summit 2019. Our students will give a cultural exchange workshop and perform on stage during the summit. Good luck!

It is Book Week at IAA this week. Please visit our book fair with your child during pick up times. Ask yourself when was the last time you visited a library or book fair with your child. Some of us do not do it often enough. Dear Parents,

I hope that you've had a lovely weekend. We've had a busy start to the week with two guest authors on campus to work with our students. Ruth Eastham is the author of a number of mysteries set in Medieval England while Matt Dickinson sets his series of books in the mountains of Nepal. In addition to talking about writing his novels, Matt also spoke about his incredible summit of Mount Everest, which was an inspiration for his writing.

Our last two assemblies have been especially good and featured some important messages. Ms Jamela's Grade 2 class showcased their talents while stressing the importance of dedication and hard work in realising achievement. Ms Iona's Grade 2 class presented a rendition of Dr Seuss' The Lorax which was incredible to watch. The importance of the environmental message "unless" in this story is crucial.

Semester 1 reports were issued last week and on Saturday, February 9th teachers are available for Parent-Teacher Conferences. Please book through your child's Moodle account. The booking system will close on Thursday at 12pm so teachers have time to prepare for their conferences.

Next week we are conducting our annual International School's Assessment (ISA) diagnostic tests for students in Grades 3 to 5. They test core skills in reading, writing and mathematical literacy. As we use these tests to benchmark the quality of our programmes, it is essential that students arrive at school on Monday and Tuesday on time. Please be sure that they have slept well and have had a healthy breakfast. We look forward to continued success and affirmation of the teaching and learning that takes place at IAA.

Last week's Bake Sale raised close to 1,400 JD for the Atafaluna Organisation. This group supports children that are in need of treatment and medical care who lack the resources. We trust that our contribution will be well utilised to provide children with the chance to live a better life.

A number of parents are unfamiliar with our Gate Policy, which we strictly adhere to for all of our students' learning and the continuity of classes. Students that arrive after 7:55am are considered late and if this happens three times, they will be denied access to the school. Students that arrive to school after 8am when the gate is closed will not be allowed entry to the school regardless of the number of lates they have incurred. We do understand that on occasion there may be extenuating circumstances behind a student being late for school and ask that you contact our receptionist about this ahead of time, preferably the day before. Pre-K students are exempted from this policy, but we do appreciate them being at school as close to 8am as possible.

Library News

The IAA Book Fair is in full swing. Students and parents are getting used to having more space for a greater selection of books. The Book Fair will remain on campus until Wednesday, 7 February. For library classes this week, students in G2-5 will visit the Book Fair to see if there are books they would like. Parents are welcome to the Book Fair at pick-up Sunday to Wednesday, as the tables will be open until 3:30pm. This year, participating vendors include Dar Al Hayat, Maktabetcom.com, Yarmouk Book Distribution Centre, University Books, Dar Al Manhal and Mzaya Books. All of them will offer a wide variety of quality fiction and nonfiction books in Arabic and English.

On Sunday, 3 February, Grades 1-4 attended writing workshops with author Ruth Eastham. Ruth's books have won many awards. Her debut, ***The Memory Cage***, was shortlisted for the Waterstones Children's Book Prize and nominated for the Carnegie Medal. She is Patron of Reading at schools in the Midlands and Cheshire. She has been a visiting author in schools across the UK and internationally, and been a speaker at many literature events, including the Edinburgh Book Festival.

Ruth revealed the exciting real-life dramas and mysteries behind her books - the legendary warrior queen, Boudicca, and her tribe's fight against Roman invaders, superstitions surrounding the mysterious Will o'the Wisps, dead Viking bodies entombed in glaciers, secret wartime codes, and manuscripts that tell of lost, treasure-laden South American cities. Students learned about the life of a writer and how they find inspiration, as well as draft and shape their stories.

On Monday, 4 February, Grades 5-7 will attend workshops with author Matt Dickinson. Matt is an award-winning writer and filmmaker with a passion for climbing and adventure. During his filmmaking career, he has worked as a director/cameraman for National Geographic television, the Discovery Channel, the BBC and Channel 4. His film projects have taken him to Antarctica, Africa and the Himalaya, often in the company of the world's leading climbers and expeditioners. His most notable film success was *Summit Fever* in which Matt reached the summit of Everest via the treacherous north face. His book *The Death Zone* tells the true story of that ascent and has become a bestseller in many different countries.

Matt is currently patron of reading at Eltham College and continues to climb and explore. In January 2013, he summited Mount Aconcagua, which, at 6,965 metres, is the highest peak in the world outside the Himalaya. In 2016, and again in 2017, he was back on Everest as writer in residence with Jagged Globe's South Col Expedition. Currently, he is planning an ascent of Denali in Alaska, one of the 'seven summits'.

Recently Matt has started writing fiction for teenage readers. His debut thriller series *Mortal Chaos* was well received by critics and readers alike. Matt has followed this up with *The Everest Files*, a dramatic and popular trilogy set on the world's highest mountain. *Lie Kill Walk Away* is his latest teen thriller. When he's not writing, Matt tours the UK, speaking at schools and colleges and inspiring a new generation of adventurers.

The Primary Arabic Department has worked especially hard to schedule authors Taghreed Al-Najjar, Zeinat Al Karmi and Dima Eimesayel to read locally-written Arabic children's stories. We are looking forward to a week of celebrating literacy at IAA!
