I'MUN 2018

I'MUN 2018, *Political Parallax*, has officially come to an end. These past three days were filled with constructive dialogue and exchange on urgent global issues dissected from various perspectives. The Human Rights Council exposed modern slavery in the Middle East. The Economic and Social Council discussed the impacts of the US-China tariff war. The Arabic League debated means of resolving the diplomatic crisis in Qatar. These were just a small fraction of the topics that were researched, negotiated and debated on. Congratulations to the I'MUN 2018 Team. Rest assured that you have led by example and have fostered an environment for all participants to express their viewpoints on political, economic and social issues, thus positively impacting on their development as citizens, social actors and leaders.

A special thank you to our keynote guest speakers- Mr. Robert Jenkins (Unicef Jordan Representative) and Mr. Lex Takkenburg (Chief of the Ethics Office at UNRWA). They both delivered powerful messages, reminding us that our world today is very young- the largest young generation to date. They stressed that our youth must be encouraged and empowered to act as they are a source of innovation, ideas and solutions. It is their civic responsibility to understand the different perspectives, engage and speak out to address head on the challenges that emerge from new technologies, environmental change and globalisation.

Majlis Al Arabi

A great conference came to an end, but our students continue to work to prepare for the 4th annual Majlis Al Arabi on November 23rd-24th, in collaboration with the Al-Asriyya School. The theme will be “Our Future Unites Us”. It follows the MUN framework, where controversial issues related to the Arab region will be dissected using the Arabic language as the mode of communication. Our Secretariat Team will begin this week training a large number of students from private and public schools on the rules and procedures. We encourage our Grades 8 to 11 students to participate as delegates as it is necessary that they think for themselves to develop their own opinions on issues that are literally taking place in their own backyard.

Hawks

Cross Country: Our students competed in the annual ICS cross country competition last weekend. We have enjoyed considerable success in this event over the years and this time was no different. We picked 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in the main event and our students across the Grades were very competitive.

Volleyball: After a series of friendly matches in the past few weeks, this weekend saw the start of the AAC championship. There is very strong competition between the schools this year and our under 18s and under 14s have had some memorable games. G8 Jordan Museum Trip

On Oct 21st, as part of the unit on the Abbasids era in Individuals and Societies, Grade 8s visited the Jordan Museum in Ras Al Ain. They were exposed to the accomplishments of great Arab and Muslim scholars. This trip has proven to take our students back in time where women and men truly pushed the limits of critical and creative thinking to produce technology that we cannot live without today.

G10 – Personal Project

The G10s are now working on their written report for the Personal Project. Progress reports of how the G10s are doing with the PP have been emailed home. We are devoting many PSHE sessions for G10s to work on their report; however, it is important that our students meet with their supervisors to get feedback on their work. The deadline to hand in their draft for the PP is on November 7th.

G10 – Service As Action Community Forum

If someone was to ask what is the value of MYP then maybe this initiative encapsulates it all. As part of their Service as Action project, G10s are exploring topics on the role of government, society, and the global community in providing and ensuring fairness and development. In doing so, the students will be conducting local and regional research on the following topics as it applies in Jordan: mental health/illnesses, female empowerment, poverty, homelessness, child labor and social security. They will then present their research findings and actions plans on November 15th from 12:00-3.15pm in a Community Forum in the MPR. Parents are welcome to attend.

The foundation for this comes from the interdisciplinary learning taking place in English and Individuals and Societies (IAS) where in English, students are studying of Mice and Men and learning about a couple of characters on the fringes of society and the problems they face. Add to this the historical learning that is taking place in IAS where students learn about the Great Depression in the USA (which is the socio-economic backdrop to Of Mice and Men, and then bring into this mix the work on social justice movements that students take in IAS. All you really need is the modern and local context to make it all become real and a very authentic and rich learning experience, hence the SAA Community Forum. That is the beauty of the MYP.
